We don't yet know the final numbers on how many children we will facilitate in reaching permanency this year, but I am pleased to report that through the end of the third guarter 119 children were returned to their biological families, were placed with relatives through guardianships, or were adopted.

Many churches became involved with CarePortal, which is a great platform to provide needed goods for families to reduce the number of children entering foster care or to aid in a child in foster care being able to return home sooner. If your church is not involved, we would be happy to visit with you about how you might become involved.

The youth drop-in center on the Lowe-Frillman Campus in Bridgeton is on the verge of opening to minister to children and youth who are classified as "homeless" in this part of the state. One of the goals is to do assessments and provide services to address safety, health, and well-being, and, most importantly, to share with them the love of Jesus.

As we go through the holidays of Thanksgiving and Christmas and enjoy special times with family and friends, let's be sure to give praise and thanks to the birth of the Christ child who is the only true source of hope, healing, and restoration.

As I look back on 2023 writing this article, on this beautiful Friday, November 3rd, 2023; from the MBCH Foundation perspective I would say the best term to define it would be "newness". We have brought a lot of newness to our Missouri Baptist constituents across the state, and it is our hope that you have appreciated and enjoyed this newness. We have developed a new logo for MBCH and all its affiliates, new promotional literature, a new programmatic and interactive approach to social media, new banners, new table runners, new events, a new more end-user friendly website, etc. In addition to this, and first and foremost, thanks to the faithful generosity of our donors across the state the financial needs of our ministries have been met, and it is our hope that they will continue to be met as we close out 2023. If you haven't considered giving, or haven't given to your MBCH and The LIGHT House please prayerfully consider a year-end gift. MBCH Children and Family Ministries (MBCH-CFM) as well as The LIGHT House still have tax credits available for our donors that would like to make the choice where their Missouri state taxes go, and we will do our best to make that process as easy as we can for our donors as we always have. But is financial support the only way to give?

Today I pulled up our 3rd quarter 2023 MBCH-CFM statistical report, and my heart was stirred. We had several referrals for placement for therapeutic residential care at one of our campuses that we had to turn away, simply because we didn't have the residential specialist staff to field the referrals. That's children in Missouri that were unable to be served by your MBCH and sent to other locations where they may, or may not hear of the hope, healing, and restoration offered through the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ; as well as receive Christ-centered emotional, physical, and psychological care. Wow! I am praying and trusting that God is working in the hearts of 20-25 people in Missouri Baptist life that feel Christ calling them to take up their cross and follow Him to minister to the least of these.

Is it an easy job? No. However, Jesus didn't promise us that following Him would be easy; in fact He promised it would lead to a cross...your cross, and mine. Paul wrote in Philippians, "My goal is to know Him and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death, assuming that I will somehow reach the resurrection from among the dead."-Philippians 3:10-11 (CSB). Brother and sisters, there is no way for any of us to get to an empty tomb on Sunday, but through a cross on Friday. As you celebrate Christmas this year with your loved ones think of all those children MBCH-CFM had to turn away, and think on, wherever they are, whether or not they are having the opportunity to be taught the true reason we celebrate Christmas. That God sent His only begotten Son that they might have restored relationship with Him and eternal life now and forevermore.

So, as we close out 2023 please consider giving above and beyond for the least of these; for, in this we know that we are known by Him, and as we look ahead to 2024 consider whether Christ might be calling you to lay down your life for Him daily and take up your cross so that MBCH-CFM can bring hope, healing and restoration to every child referred to residential ministries.

One of the young men that came recently asked if they were allowed to work through their lunch break and wanted to stay late.

Individuals and small church groups also jumped right in to help in the campus store as we prepared for the Christmas rush. We have two of our volunteers that have made the toy room their personal mission. They have done an amazing job organizing and staging the room so that the gifts can be easily located and distributed for each child and family. It is fun to watch their excitement each time they come.

We have a young lady who is completing her high school community service hours by working in the campus store. She has helped by organizing part of the toy area and cleaning and organizing the school supply and hygiene sections.

#### Springfield Office Renovation

Buildings are like people; each has its own history and story to be told. When I first started with MBCH, I wasn't aware of this particular building's history. Once termed "a house of darkness and death," the MBCH Springfield location was previously used by one of the state's abortion providers. The building's image in the community changed drastically in December 2007 when MBCH Children and Family Ministries moved in. Since then, we have been a light in the community dedicated to reuniting families and advocating for children.

In September 2023, 1837 E Cherry St., Springfield, MO once again had new life breathed into it. Our President, Russell Martin, recognized that the office building was overdue for a face-lift and was able to find some amazing people from his church to help do the needed work. Two men, Ken Sivcovich and Stan Norton from First Baptist Church in St. Charles, MO took on three weeks of intensive, hard work to renovate the building. They gathered volunteers from their church to come to Springfield to help with the renovations and worked 10 to 12 hour days. Rob Brewer, with Second Baptist Church in Springfield, MO, was also gracious enough to send volunteers and stopped

by to learn about the history of our building, meet employees, and then continued to check in to see if there was anything we needed during this time of transition. Walls were repaired and painted, doors and frames were painted, and new flooring was installed. In addition, the desks and chairs used by the staff were replaced.

We were able to use Second Baptist Church's beautiful facility for training while our office building was being updated and were we are extremely grateful to the church for their hospitality.

In addition, Ron Robinson, pastor of Glenstone Baptist Church, opened the doors to his church and provided housing for the volunteers as well as some meals.

Our Office Manager, Cathy Rowan, was instrumental in keeping the crew going by providing them with plenty of snacks, water, and iced tea, as well as lunches, some of which were homemade. In an effort to show how thankful we were for the work being done on our building, employees made breakfast for the crew and brought in fountain drinks for them. We were also fortunate enough to be able to arrange a lunch with the renovation crew and MBCH staff so we could pray for the crew and express our gratitude towards them.

I don't think we could ever say thank you enough to First Baptist Church in St. Charles and Second Baptist Church in Springfield for the amount of man hours that were put into our building. Together, everyone put in close to 800 hours over a period of three weeks.






















#### **Serving** with Love

In a world of uncertainty and upheaval, our pregnancy services specialists stand as beacons of hope and compassion. They walk with women through the most difficult of times, offering guidance, support, and a listening ear.

We recently had a situation where the baby was born with a number of medical issues and was hospitalized for several months. Throughout all of this time the PS specialist was there to support the family in whatever ways that she could.

Despite the tremendous efforts by the medical professionals, the child passed away leaving the family devastated. Not only was the PS specialist one of the first calls the family made after the child passed, she was also the only non-family member invited to the funeral.

In the darkest of moments, our PS specialist was there, her presence a testament to the enduring power of love. She stood with the family, sharing their grief and offering a shoulder to cry on.

The PS specialist clearly represented the hands of Christ throughout their time together but especially that day at the funeral. Pray for all of our staff as they journey alongside our clients regardless of where the road may take them.

Our pregnancy services specialists are truly angels on earth. They walk with women through the darkest of valleys, offering hope, healing, and the love of Christ. We pray for them as they continue to journey alongside our clients, regardless of where the road may take them.

#### PROJECT UPDATE

#### Russell Martin Youth Drop-In Center, Bridgeton,MO

The Martin Youth Drop-In Center was only a dream but that dream has turned into the early stages of reality with the sounds of drilling and hammering, the hanging of drywall, the smell of paint, the scheduled delivery dates for appliances and furniture and the anticipation of approvals for various permits and inspections. We have had a few unexpected issues - a drain issue, ceiling changes as well as a few other issues identified by the building inspector. The contractors and our maintenance staff have been very busy preparing the space on the Lowe-Frillman Campus that will become the Martin Youth Drop-In Center.

We have had numerous conversations with various entities in the community who will play critical roles either as referral sources and/or resources for the young people. Background screenings and trainings for volunteers are underway. Policies and procedures are being researched and written to best meet the needs and safety of all involved.

The Martin Drop-In Center will provide a safe place for homeless or under-housed youth to come in the afternoons to get something to eat, take a shower, do some laundry, watch TV, work on homework or look for a job. Staff and volunteers will assess the needs of the young people and work on building a connection with them.

We anticipate an Open House and Opening in January 2024. Please pray that the construction, permits, and inspections are completed and approved in a timely manner. Pray for the volunteers that have started the background and training process as well as those who are considering becoming a part of this ministry. Most of all, pray for the young people who need this service- we ask that God watch over them and protect them.

#### Mbch Church Engagement

Church Engagement:
For the Church

In Matthew 25 where Jesus is sharing about the final judgment, he makes it clear that when we serve the least of these, we are serving Him (Matt. 25:31-40). While many churches desire to serve the least of these in their communities, oftentimes two things are missing. One is the answer to the question of how we can help, and the second is the actual connections to people that make it possible for the church to get engaged. The good news is that when it comes to serving children and families in crisis MBCH can offer the church ways to help along with the connections needed to serve. We work with churches and schools to offer training on how to keep children safe from abuse, and we work with churches to design ways they can serve. We have helped churches design wrap-around foster care ministries, child and family supervised visitation ministries, various types of mentoring ministries, and serving ministries using technology to make connections. All of these ministries are designed to allow the church to meet with and love the least of these right in their community and have the opportunity for relational connections.

Think for a moment. We know that God saw the broken, sinful condition of people in our world, and He moved towards us – not away from us – by sending His son. As believers we should be moving towards hurting people in our world. One of the newer and most exciting opportunities we have begun to offer churches is the option to join a network of serving churches in their region who see and respond to physical needs of children and their families. In order to do this, we utilize a technology platform known as CarePortal. The folks at CarePortal don't do ministry directly, instead they have designed and operate a technology platform. CarePortal defines itself as technology that drives action for children and families in crisis. MBCH is an implementing partner with CarePortal.

By utilizing this technology, MBCH can help your church find opportunities for connections to children and families in crisis right in your community. When you sign up to participate in our CarePortal network, you get notified every time a professional in your community puts a vetted need into the CarePortal system. You then have opportunity to not only meet the need, but have a relational connection. When the people of your church begin to go out from the church to engage with children and families they may be meeting a physical need, but it creates a relational opportunity. Relationships are powerful, Dr. Karyn Purvis states: *Relationships heal what relationships hurt*.

Think about that statement. If someone in your neighborhood has experienced horrible things or trauma in their upbringing or in their relationships, God can use healthy relationships to bring healing. There is no organization better suited to bring hope and healing to children and families in crisis than the church.

I encourage you to consider how your church might serve alongside MBCH and gain opportunities for growth and discipleship as together we serve the least of these. We are always looking for churches to partner with us as we continue to increase the number of children and families we are serving in communities all across the state by engaging with churches just like yours.
